Speaking of Free, a big shout-out to Lisa Hermants who pointed me to a really neat little app (and more) that works EXACTLY like Senteos or iClickers. It's called Plicker, it's free, and works with iPad or iPhone. You do create an account, upload class lists (and this is a US site, so PLEASE don't add students full names in your class roster--it's super easy to use code names or initials). Next you write either Multiple Choice or T/F questions and print off the student Plicker sheets. The app uses your phone or iPad camera as a QR-style scanner, and reads and records all the student responses. The sheets are each unique--up to 60, and you can have as many class sets as you like, and they can be used over and over. Drop me a line if you want me to come in and do a demo-- it's SWEET! I made my 15-year-old do a test run for me and even he thought it was neat. (Poor teacher-kids....)





And finally, let me remind you that I welcome the opportunity to work with teachers, staffs and students. Recently I've been doing Book Creator and Stop Motion lessons in several classes. Let me know if you'd like a classroom visit, or some lunch-time or after school coaching. As I wrote in a recent blog post, I will meet you where you are (metaphorically and geographically).
